Why do we need a categorisation system? The categorisation system gives a clear and fair picture of how well your child's school is performing compared with other schools across Wales. It also helps to identify the schools that need the most help, support and guidance to improve. The Welsh Government and regional consortia have developed the system together. The main purpose of the system is to identify, across Wales, the schools that need the most support. The colour category of support given to a school will trigger a tailored support programme. The system is based on three simple steps. It is not driven by figures and takes into account the quality of leadership and learning and teaching in our schools.

GREEN

- Highly effective.
- These schools have a track record of raising standards and have the capacity to support other schools to do better.
- · Will receive up to four days support.

YELLOW

- Effective school already doing well and knows the areas needed to improve.
- By identifying the right support and taking action has the potential to do even better.
- Will receive up to 10 days support.

AMBER

- School in need of improvement which needs help to identify the steps to improve, or make changes more quickly through discussions with the regional school improvement service and local authority.
- This school will receive a full package of support.
- Will receive up to 15 days of support.

RED:

- School in need of greatest improvement and will receive immediate intensive support.
- Progress will be closely monitored to make sure necessary improvements take place as quickly as possible.
- Will receive up to 25 days of support.

- Welsh Language Development
- Knowledge and Understanding of the World
- Physical Development
- Creative Development.

KS2 – Class 3

KS2 pupils have followed the New National Curriculum Wales

The purpose of the new curriculum is to support our children and young people to be:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives
- enterprising, creative contributors, ready to play a full part in life and work
- ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world
- healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.

We have 6 'Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLE).

- Expressive arts.
- · Health and well-being.
- Humanities (including RE which should remain compulsory to age 16).
- Languages, literacy and communication (including Welsh, which should remain compulsory to age 16, and modern foreign languages).
- Mathematics and numeracy.
- Science and technology.

It also includes 3 cross-curricular responsibilities: literacy, numeracy and digital competence.

Extra-Curricular Activities and After School Clubs

The school offers a range of enriched activities both in school time and as an after school club. Last year we were fortunate enough to be able to increase these learning opportunities for our pupils. We are thankful to the staff members and parents who give their time to support these valuable experiences for our children.

Many events and activities took place both in and out of school last year and we are very grateful to our pupils, parents, grandparents and community members who make our school a friendly, caring and exciting place to learn. They also provide the support to enable the children to take part in lots of activities and visits.

October also saw the class 3 visit to Llanthony Priory, where the children enjoyed an

historical talk and a walk reflecting on the amazing building and absorbing the serenity of the wonderful place. The Puppet Soup company visited and all the children enjoyed watching their production *Cats*.



November, as usual, got off with a Bang! During our Bonfire Night which was well attended. A big thank you to Keith Valentine-Powell and Mike Smith for the wonderful firework display. November also saw two of our class 3 pupils, complete their Bronze ambassador awards, learning how to encourage and develop sport in our school. Well done to the two of them!

Trips were enjoyed by the whole school too, supporting their topic of castles and historical buildings. Class 3 visited Llancaich Fawr, and Foundation Phase enjoyed looking at castle features, and climbing many steps at both Caerphilly Castle and Castell Coch. It was a very wet day but a lovely experience too.





Another thankyou to the parents who helped to transport a group of pupils to Sunnybank nursing home, where they delighted residents with a selection of Christmas songs, and some upbeat Christmas songs from their Christmas show. A very good effort on spreading joy at Christmas time.

In December, the singing and festive cheer continued as a group of children went carol singing outside Morrisons in Abergavenny. Again many thanks to those who transported our children, and their singing voices too. They raised £152.40 Da iawn.



Keeping with the spirit of Christmas, pupils decorated a Christmas Tree in St. Edmunds, Crickhowell and were awarded 1st Place (£25).

Foundation Phase was transformed into an elf workshop throughout December,



being set Christmas tasks daily, which they completed independently. Some wonderful creations were made, the biggest Christmas tree made from boxes, a special elf house,





and too many decorations to mention. Slowly the class

room turned into a wonderfully



decorated Christmas room.

The whole school enjoyed an Elf day in December, where the children busied themselves ready for the Christmas fayre in the afternoon. Thankyou to

everyone who donated items, gave up their time and

spent money at the Christmas Fayre. A grand total of £542.51 was raised.

The highlight of the school year was undoubtedly the Christmas production, *Christmas Around the World,* which was thoroughly enjoyed by schoolchildren, staff and the whole audience at St Peter's Church. The children represented Wales, Africa,

The Christmas celebrations continued with a trip to the New Theatre in Cardiff to watch Cinderella, the school Christmas lunch, Christmas jumper day (raising £29), and a Christmas party, which Mother Christmas visited. Such a lot of fun to end the year.

The new year saw a new weekly challenge day for Foundation Phase, where they worked together in small groups on a variety of practical cooking and model making activities, with no adult intervention.







In cooking activities the children were presented with a sheet of instructions and selection of cooking equipment and ingredients. In their groups they had to demonstrate teamwork, and follow instructions accurately applying their numeracy and literacy skills. Some of our children proved to be natural leaders.







The model making challenge involved the children working in their small groups to design and make a model of St Peter's Church, using a variety of empty boxes and packages, a great use of recycling. Again the children were left to work in their groups, appointing each member a role. The children showed very good skills of leadership, suggesting improvements and working together as a team.

After each challenge the children self-evaluated their work, the sessions were completed with enthusiasm and the children had a sense of pride and ownership of their end results.











Pupils and parents enjoyed another Christingle service led by Rev. Chris – the House Team challenge was won by Eagles, and this was followed by readings, prayers and lighting the candles which were made by the pupils in the morning with Rev. Chris.

February saw more challenges for Foundation Phase; and more designs and competitions set through Class 3 Genius Hour projects.

The competition was well received and the judging was incredibly hard. Due to the school lockdown in March, the pots of flowers were delivered to doorsteps in the community, enriching the sight of many people.




Foundation Phase also worked hard at home, here's a selection of their pieces:
